

A message from the Co-Chairs

It is with great pleasure that we invite you to join us in Tel Aviv, Israel, for the 7th Annual International IARPP Conference entitled "The Shadow of Memory: Relational Perspectives on Remembering and Forgetting." We invite you to participate with us, whether as clinicians, private citizens or as national groupings, as we engage the dilemma and complexity of remembering and forgetting. We invite you to join with us as we consider how we cling to our memories even as we seek to sequester them, deny them or rework them. Our conference takes place at the beautiful David Intercontinental Hotel that is located at the border of Tel Aviv - Jaffa. The city of Tel Aviv, which celebrates its 100 year anniversary at this time, is one of the liveliest cities in the world. Its preponderance of Bauhaus architecture has it named as a UNESCO Heritage site. Amidst the bustle of the reconstructions emerging out of this UNESCO recognition you will also encounter a modern city steeped in a complex and multilayered past and recent history. The name Jaffa or Yafo is most probably a western Semitic one, being related to the Hebrew word yafah, which signifies "beautiful" or agreeable. There are several legends about the origin of the name Jaffa. Some say it is named for Japheth, one of the sons of Noah, who built it after the Great Flood.

The recent history of Israel meets it both as a conflict area between Jews and Arabs and as the home of Jews, Arabs, Armenian and Christians living in coexistence. This is emblematic of our intended plea for dialogue – a true dialogue amongst us all that we hope can advance and deepen our perspectives and understanding. We hope that the experience we offer you with our invited and chosen speakers from the international IARPP community at this particular place and in these particular times of turbulence, will highlight the dialectics of remembering and forgetting, of despair, crisis and hope. We are sure that the experience you encounter will be unforgettable.

*** Preface to the large group**

The large group provides an opportunity to experience and explore the subjective and inter-subjective meanings of being a part of a group, a culture and a society. A conference in the Middle East and in Israel may arouse a variety of emotions and attitudes concerning socio-political conflicts. Issues of power and submission, affiliation and exclusion, hostility and reconciliation may become a part of our participation in the large group. The large group provides a space for expressing different views, attitudes and conflicts and hopefully helps us in the task towards mutual recognition and a better co-existence of differences and similarities. Any expression of subjectivity may serve as a revelation of 'a voice' that is a part of the whole group. Whatever is said in the large group may express an unacknowledged aspect of others. The role of the conductors is to hold the large group by time keeping and by facilitating talking and listening. The conductors sometimes may aim at deciphering some sub-conscious themes that may be unrecognized in the group.
